2. Course Description & Intended Learning Outcomes

In this final program course, students demonstrate mastery of the advanced beginner level by completing a capstone project. Through a variety of approved methods and with instructor guidance, students illustrate their program success and practice readiness. Emphasis is on students critically evaluating their personal learning progress and creating professional goals. Students showcase their academic prowess and clinical expertise by presenting their capstone projects to the public at a poster symposium.

Upon successful completion of this course a student will be able to:

- a) evaluate personal readiness to enter the workforce as a Medical Radiation Technologist.
- b) create a personal plan for ongoing professional success and development
- c) develop, summarize, and present a multifaceted, evidence based, academically rigorous project that demonstrates personal completion of all Medical Radiography program outcomes.

May: Project plan with specific timeline is submitted and reviewed with advisor

June and July: Independent project work with scheduled meetings with advisor. An average of 4 hours a week is recommended to dedicate towards project completion

1 week before Symposium: Final paper/project report and abstract is submitted to D2L

Capstone Symposium: Scheduled during week 14. Students should use given academic time from clinical sites to travel and prepare for presentation

DST	The student has met and exceeded, above and beyond expectation, the goals, criteria, or competencies established for this course, practicum or field placement.
NC	The student has not met the goals, criteria or competencies established for this course, practicum or field placement.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.

CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
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
