

Admission Requirements



Indigenous Limited Priority Admissions

- The School of Health & Human Services (HHS) offers Priority Seating for Indigenous students in all Health related programs.

- The Indigenous Limited Priority Admissions process, approved by the Board of Governors, supported by the Education Council, and approved by the BC Human Rights Tribunal, welcomes applications from all qualified Indigenous applicants.



- ** Students may be able to use or demonstrate alternative ongoing currency in certain requirements.



Casper Situational Judgment Test (Non-Academic Assessment)

- You will receive registration and scheduling instructions for the nonacademic assessment (Casper test).
- There is an approximate **\$50 fee** associated with the Casper test that has not been factored into the total program fees.
- Students may take the assessment one time per application cycle and must do so within the prescribed timeframe indicated by the program.
- Students applying to other Allied Health & Technologies programs at Camosun College need only take the assessment once per application cycle.

Applicant Ranking

Qualified applicants are ranked

- 50% of each students' rank comes from their GPA of the admission requirements only, no other grades are used in the calculation.
- 50% of each students' rank comes from their non-academic assessment (CASPer Test)
- There is no interview process and no resume/cover letter required
- Up to 16 of the top ranked students receive an invitation to the program.
- Two priority seats are reserved for applicants with Indigenous Ancestry

*Students will pay a \$175.00 deposit to hold a seat; the deposit goes towards your first semester tuition but is non-refundable if you change your mind.



Program Waitlist

- The program maintains a short waitlist for late entry into the same year due to student withdrawals or deferrals. <u>Waitlists are not retained for future years.</u>
- Applicants who do not receive a seat in the year of their application need to reapply in order to be eligible in a subsequent year.
- Applicants will have to re-take the non-academic assessment (Casper test) in each application year.
- You only have to take it once per application year for all AHT programs at Camosun. The assessment company will send your results to multiple schools for a small fee.



Admission Requirements

Required for your online application by September 13, 2024

- A completed <u>Physical Requirements Form</u> (this can be filled out online)
- Attend a SONO Information Session & complete online questionnaire. <u>Be sure you do the survey!</u>
- 40 hrs volunteer work in a patient related environment (interactive role) e.g. Long-term care - require letter from supervisor confirming 40 hours and responsibilities performed – some health care professionals can use prior work experience*

Program Participation Requirements

DO NOT begin these before being offered a <u>seat!</u>



Criminal Record Check

Students are required to do a <u>Criminal Record Check</u> (<u>CRC</u>).

- Camosun will provide details prior to clinical work starting.
- Previous CRCs may be accepted for this purpose.

* Please note, your local police station will charge a fee for this service. *Students are responsible for these costs.



Maskfit Testing

Students must have yearly respirator mask 'fit-testing' done.

• Students will be responsible for completing this process prior to the first clinical experience

*Students are responsible for these costs.



Basic Life Support

Students must have completed and be current in Basic Life Support prior to practicum.

• Annual recertification must be maintained throughout the program.

Students will be responsible for the cost of this certification.



Tuberculosis (TB)Testing Students must provide evidence that they do not have <u>active</u> TB.

- Acceptable evidence is a negative TB skin test or a negative chest x-ray.
- Evidence must be dated no more than six months before clinical exposure starts.
- Additional testing is required after possible exposure to TB and/or travel within an area that there is a known prevalence of TB.

*Previously having TB or a previous positive test <u>does not automatically</u> exclude a student from participation



*Students are responsible for the cost of testing.

Immunizations

Students must provide evidence of their immunizations or immunity to preventable, communicable diseases, including COVID-19. To attend clinical at our partner sites, students **MUST** be fully vaccinated per the <u>Practice Education</u> <u>Guidelines of B.C.</u>

Note: An individual is considered Fully Vaccinated when they are at least seven (7) days post-receipt of the second dose
of a World Health Organization approved COVID-19 vaccine

Students are highly recommended to maintain current immunizations as per the Practice Education Guidelines of B.C. Recommended immunizations are found on the Health Sciences Placement Network (HSPNet) of Canada website by searching for immunization guidelines.

*Failure to comply with immunization guidelines could result in the health care organization or the College barring the individual from the clinical/practicum setting until proof of immunity is provided and/or until a communicable disease outbreak is declared over. This could impact a student's ability to successfully complete the clinical/practicum placement and/or a clinical/community rotation.






What are Sonograms or Ultrasounds?





Pictures produced using sound waves in the same way bats use sound for echolocation!







What is Diagnostic Medical Sonography?

It is the art and science of producing medical images using sound waves

- Sonograms are used to help physicians diagnose and treat disease and injury
- A sonographer produces images that a radiologist interprets to aid in diagnosing a patient
- Ultrasound can be used on every part of the body—not just for babies!



Role of the Sonographer

- Prepare the exam room and ultrasound equipment to conduct examinations
- Recognize and record the appropriate anatomy and pathology using sonographic equipment
- Write reports based upon the scan results and completion
- Alert appropriate medical staff of any abnormalities that need immediate attention
- Use the ability to solve problems and make decisions
- Work independently or with minimal supervision and as part of a team
- Manage multiple priorities and projects, and display flexibility in a fast-paced work environment
- Maintain the strictest levels of confidentiality
- Pursue professional development for the continual improvement of patient care






Role of the Sonographer

Sonographers also participate in a variety of scenarios beyond imaging by being involved in or assisting with:

- Miscarriages, Fetal Abnormalities, Fetal Demise and Pregnancy Termination
- Cancer diagnoses, palliative procedures
- Assisting patients with toileting, vomiting or their IVs
- Imaging critically ill patients in the various ICUs
- Interventional Procedures:
 - Various biopsies—ie) Liver, Kidney, Thyroid, Prostate etc.
 - Drainages—removing fluid from around the lungs or the abdomen by inserting a tube through the skin
 - Abscess drainages—removing pus from wounds
 - Joint injections, contrast injections
 - Pericardial (around the heart) drainages












Role of the Sonographer – General Vascular Imaging





Carotid artery bifurcation without significant narrowing







The Sonography (SONO) Program

- Intense 24 months of study (*no summer breaks*!)
- 4 month long terms; 6 terms in total
- Classroom with labs (including simulation) alternating with clinical semesters with online courses
- In Terms 2-5, courses are 50% Asynchronous—time management is important to keep pace with the material
- In addition to using simulators, students act as surrogate patients to learn positioning techniques as well as interpersonal skills
- Classes run 5 days/week, often from 0830 1730 hrs
- Students are expected to practice up to 14 hours/week (not including lab hours already scheduled in the program)

About Electives Requirements

- Sonographers are at high risk for workplace injury due to long hours of performing repetitive tasks and the demanding physical nature of scanning.
- Electives should help students integrate knowledge of health, nutrition, and personal wellness supports long-term physical functioning in the workplace while enhancing potential personal and professional success.
- Electives may come from the following Camosun courses (or equivalent transfer credit):
 - 3 Credits of electives can come from of the following subject areas within any Social Sciences, Humanities, or Fine Arts courses with the following course codes:
 - ANTH, ART, GSWS, HLTH, MUSC, PSYC, PHIL, REL, SOC, SOCW
 - 3 Credits of electives can come from any of the following subject areas within Sport & Exercise:
 - SPMA
- You may choose to complete these electives *during any term of the program* and may use equivalent transfer credits to satisfy this requirement.

6 credits of Electives are **<u>REQUIRED</u>** for program completion*

*NOTE: Elective courses cannot be calculated in total program costs.

Clinical Experience

Clinical placements will be at a variety of sites on Vancouver Island

- Students participate in one of two different clinical experiences, depending on placement availability
 - Cardiac
 - General/OB
- Not all specialties are offered at all sites
- Students are responsible for providing their own transportation and accommodations while on their clinical placement; keep these costs in mind

There are no guarantees that students will receive their preferred site placements OR preferred specialty

Investing in your future

Cost of Schooling:

- \$47,753 ÷ 6 Terms = an average of about \$7,958/term
- \$7,958 ÷ 4 Months (per term) = about **\$1,989/month**
- About \$497/week, <u>\$99/day or about \$13/hour</u>

Employment Potential working full time:

- Approx. \$75,000/year @ 37.5 hrs/week to start
- Earning about \$5800/month to start
- From \$38.70/hour almost *triple* your investment in just two years!
